Why NGRT matters:

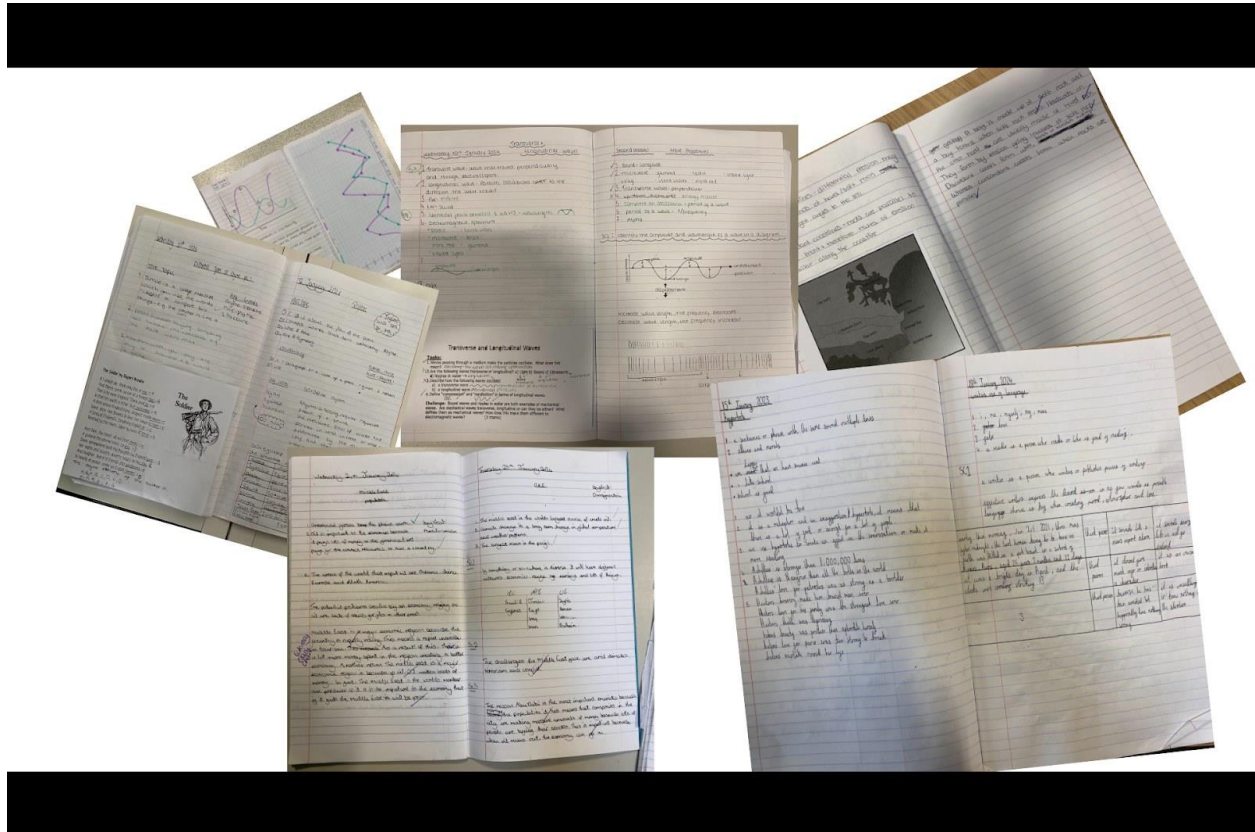
- It helps identify any gaps or areas where additional support may be needed.

Quality Classwork



Leaving school with strong grades is essential for progressing into further education and good-quality employment. That's why producing high-quality work across all subjects is so important. Well-structured responses and thoughtful engagement with teacher feedback are proven to improve outcomes.

Mr Attwood has consistently reminded students throughout the year to take pride in their work and assessments by doing the small things well. He recently met with a group of students to discuss the quality of work across year groups, where the value of feedback was again emphasised.

Your child regularly receives verbal feedback in lessons, as well as written feedback through tools such as the **Smith Proforma** or **Personal Currency Plans**. Students who are making the

most progress are those who act on this feedback—by editing and improving their work accordingly.

One key area we're focusing on is improving the quality and presentation of written work, aiming to meet the highest standards in school. In today's world, the ability to present information clearly and professionally is highly valued—both in the workplace and at GCSE level. Developing these habits now sets students up for future academic and career success.

To support this at home, we ask that you help reinforce the following:

- **Encourage Neatness:** Support your child in keeping their handwriting clear and their page layout organised. Tools like a ruler can help maintain structure.
- **Promote Attention to Detail:** Remind them to review their work before submission, checking for accuracy and completeness—whether on paper or platforms like Educake.
- **Provide the Right Tools:** Ensure your child has the necessary stationery to present their work neatly.
- **Lead by Example:** Share examples of well-presented work—this could be from books, professional documents, or your own work—to show the value of clarity and structure.
